- Artists' Film International 2025 presents *Dream States* a programme of artist films from around the globe that dismantle reality and envision alternative futures, running from 3 March 31 December 2025.
- Featuring 16 moving-image works, including a Forma co-commission by Turner Prize nominee Sin Wai Kin, and new films by Heesoo Kwon, Babu Eshwar Prasad and Anette Gellein.
- Curated by Forma with 16 arts organisations who present the programme across four continents including a new partnership with Southwark Park Galleries, London and returning AFI partners Istanbul Modern, Türkiye and MCAD Manila, Philippines

Artists' Film International 2025: Dream States

Worldwide presentations 3 March - 31 December 2025 artistsfilminternational.com

Dream States – the 18th edition of Artists' Film International – commences on 3 March 2025 with a visionary programme of artists' moving image. Exploring dreaming as both a transformative state and a radical act, the films in Dream States challenge perceptions of reality and open pathways to alternative futures. Curated by Forma with 16 cultural institutions across four continents, this year's edition showcases a remarkable cohort of artists, each selected or commissioned by an AFI'25 partner. Presented in diverse formats, including exhibitions, festivals, and screenings, AFI'25 unfolds across the partners' venues throughout 2025, guiding global audiences through mythic worlds, dystopian landscapes, fractured memories, and speculative possibilities.

At the intersection of personal consciousness and external realities, Dream States explores the emancipatory potential of dreams, altered states, and cinematic illusion. The programme foregrounds artists who disrupt linear time, blur fact and fiction, and navigate the boundaries between memory, myth, and fantasy to reimagine the world anew. Using an array of visual strategies, from analogue footage to CGI animation, layered archival materials, special effects and AI-generated imagery, these works harness moving-image to destabilise dominant perspectives. Reflecting upon shared histories, the artists' eclectic and surreal dreamscapes - utopian and dystopian, intimate and collective - position cinema as the crucible of dream-making and a vehicle for changemaking.

Highlights include: Turner Prize and Jarman Award shortlisted artist Sin WaiKin's new film The Fortress (2024), co-commissioned by Lahore Biennale Foundation and Forma, which examines the fragmented nature of human existence and critiques the notion of our singular, homogenized experience; CGI animated In Leymusoom Garden: New Sun (2024) by Heesoo Kwon, whose oneiric and unique visual language create memoryscapes of personal and community liberation; winner of the JCDecaux Audience Choice Award Mykolas Valantinas presents Lullaby's Fault (2023), a film that explores the interior of a fractured and incoherent psyche; Ahmet Rüstem Ekici and Hakan Sorar's AI generated moving image work The Pond (2023) explores transformation, memory, and the connection between humans and nature; Elinor O'Donovan's playful Wild Geese 2: Wilder Geese (2023) explores environmental existentialism, offering a tantalising dream-state existence where empathy might live; the black-and-white time-lapse video Distopian Patterns (2019) by Isabelle Nouzha depicts a 'waking nightmare'; Anca Benera and Arnold Estefan's surreal film Rehearsals for Peace (2023) interweaves imagery of contemporised folklore traditions with military presence within a pastoral Transylvanian village; Cocoy Lumbao's untitled film is a digitisation of 8mm analogue film captured by his parents in 1994, which uses nostalgia and memory as a form of a dream state; Anette Gellein's Dyke Dreams (2024) takes the form of an erotic commercial that gradually transforms into a horror movie; and the visually layered and poetic film Dear Chalam (2024) by Babu Eshwar Prasad overlaps dreams and memories considering the potentialities of cinema as a vehicle for constant re-imagination. The full artistic programme will be announced on 3 March 2025.

Heesoo Kwon, whose film was selected for AFI'25 by Los Angeles Contemporary Exhibitions, says:

Dreaming and altered states of reality offer individuals and societies a profound space for transformation, healing, and self-discovery. They allow us to step beyond the limitations of the waking world, exploring the subconscious and unlocking hidden aspects of our identities, histories, and potential futures.

As an artist, a democratic, international film program like Artists' Film International is a vital platform for engaging in cross-cultural dialogue and understanding. It allows me to connect my work with a broader, more diverse audience and participate in meaningful conversations about shared experiences across borders.

Dream States continues the collective effort of Artists' Film International to expand the possibilities of artists' moving image challenging curatorial conventions, presentation formats, and the boundaries of interdisciplinary filmmaking. This year's edition builds on the momentum of AFI'24, amplifying the programme's impact and deepening conversations around the transformative potential of moving-image. The AFI partners are rejoined by **Istanbul Modern** and **MCAD Manila**, further strengthening the programme's global network, introducing an exhilarating line-up of diverse artistic perspectives. Forma's new partnership with **Southwark Park Galleries** will see the London premiere of Sin Wai Kin's *The Fortress*, co-commissioned by Forma and Lahore Biennial, alongside a three-month presentation of the full AFI'25 programme in summer 2025.

Antonia Shaw, Head of Programmes, Forma says:

Forma is thrilled to be collaborating with 16 cultural institutions and teams around the world to co-curate and present the 18th edition of Artists' Film International.

In 2025, it feels more important than ever to support the work of artists driving change. Artists' Film International allows for limitless possibilities that push the boundaries of moving-image programming, platforming radical and courageous alternatives. Akin to the initiative's open, collaborative approach, 'Dream States' invites audiences to reimagine existing systems and realities. It's a chance to experience the work of extraordinary artists and reflect on what it means for individuals or whole communities to dream as regenerative practice or liberation.

We are particularly excited to premiere our latest commission by Sin Wai Kin at Southwark Park Galleries in London, who's thought provoking practice offers astute political and social commentary, exemplifying the range of works in AFI'25 that through moving-image probe inherited narratives and the instability of reality itself. Artists' Film International presentations will take place across the world throughout 2025, with the full programme announced on 3 March. Since 2024 the programme has been convened by London based arts organisation, Forma. AFI is an alternative, lateral programme that exemplifies non-hierarchical, borderless and collaborative curatorial models. Responding to urgent global topics, the programme cultivates collective practice and cross-cultural dialogue, fosters the exchange of ideas and perspectives, and provides wide reaching visibility for artists.

Previous AFI iterations have considered the ways in which solidarity can be enacted; how we care for one another; highlight the environmental crisis; explore the impact of technology; investigate the debate surrounding truth and fake news; and ponder on what it means to collaborate. In 2024, Artists' Film International saw films screened in four continents, with presentations spanning months of 2024.

The Center for Contemporary Arts Afghanistan in eXiLe e.V. (CCAA) was established in August 2004 as the first and only centre for contemporary art in Afghanistan and in 2006 established the only women's art centre in Afghanistan to further promote women empowerment as an integral part of the democratization process and for civilization. Its aim was also to give young people the chance to express and improve their artistic talent as individuals and as creative artists to implement a new way of looking at art for the Afghan society striving towards peace, justice, democracy, freedom of expression and individuality.

The establishment of CCAA over the past five centuries was in fact a new motion and movement towards visual arts in Afghanistan. In 2008 the first Contemporary Art and the first Women's Contemporary Painting Exhibition in Afghanistan was held by CCAA artists which was a turning point in the history of visual arts in Afghanistan. The establishment of CCAA and its Women's Art Centre was a major achievement - not only for Afghanistan but also for the international community in Afghanistan.

The CCAA worked closely with many international governmental organizations, which has accelerated the CCAA's growth and raised its profile both nationally and internationally; however, this brilliance also attracted the attention of fanatics and dark thinkers, finally, the CCAA continued its activities under the name of Studio of Contemporary Arts (SCA) at the Faculty of Fine Arts, Kabul University. In 2020 - meeting the existing needs and demands - the CCAA took up its activities under the name of (Ustad Breshna) as an art training centre, growing again with young talents within and from outside of the university's environment. It had just begun its activities and spread its announcements, but its activities were stopped once again when the Taliban re-entered the city and once again all the artists of the CCAA were under severe security threats.

We take this opportunity to acknowledge the 20 young artists of CCAA -14 of whom are women - who have been evacuated by the German government. Most of them have settled in Frankfurt. In 22/11/2023 CCAA in eXiLe received the formal registration as an international organization based in Frankfurt, Germany. Since that CCAA in EXiLe had many activities in Germany and Italia in particular.

The gallery regularly participates in various art fairs, including Frieze London and New York, ARCO Madrid, Art Basel Hong Kong, Art Dubai and India Art Fair. Many of it's artists are in major international collections and are featured regularly in the most prestigious biennales and museum shows. The future of the art landscape is being shaped here.
